FEDERAL GUN LAWS CONCERNING RESIDENTS AND NON-RESIDENTS OF EACH STATE:

<u>Non-Residents:</u> Can NOT buy, sell or trade firearms to private individuals. You may sell firearms to any FFL dealer, regardless of their residency. You may buy long guns from a FFL dealer who is licensed in the same sate, provided the laws of both states are complied with.

<u>Residents</u>: May sell, buy trade from anyone who is also a resident, you can not buy, sell or trade with anyone who is not a resident. You may sell any firearms to any FFL license dealer regardless of their residency.

"NEVER" sell to anyone with a criminal or questionable background, it's not worth it, you'll be joining them in jail !!!!


John "Jack" Shelton Ragland



Long time TMCA member **William (Bill) C. Baker III**, age 73, passed away suddenly just after our last show. Bill worked as a military historian for 37 years at the Tennessee State Museum He was also a retired Army Lt. Colonel and the son of a



Museum. He was also a retired Army Lt. Colonel and the son of a retired Army Major General who was the number one graduate of his West Point Class in 1926. General Baker Sr. (then a Colonel) was with the 106th Infantry division during the Battle of the Bulge when 6,500 men of his division were captured.

Bill had probably one of the largest collections of early engraved pistols in this part of the country. His collection of firearms stretched from rare matchlock and wheel locks up to Class III weapons. Bill also collected early Armour and medieval weapons.

Former TMCA President, Charlie Suggs passes away.



Charles Nelson Suggs (age 81) was a native of Chattanooga and spent three years in the Bonny Oaks School for Homeless Children. Mr. Suggs was a graduate of Chattanooga Central High School and the University of Chattanooga where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Engineering Physics.

Mr. Suggs served honorably in the United States Army. After special training at the European Command Staff Intelligence School in Oberammergau, Germany, 1945–46 he served as the Intelligence Non-Commissioned Officer of the 4th Engineer Combat Battalion in the 4th Infantry Division.

Mr. Suggs was a long time employee of The Western Union Telegraph Company, Plant and Engineering Department, Chattanooga Works. In 1963 he accepted employment with Arnold Research organization (ARO, Inc.) as an Instrumentation Engineer at the Arnold Engineering De-

velopment Center.

He retired as a Lead Engineer in 1984 from Sverdrup Technology, Inc. at the Arnold Engineering Development Center, Arnold Air Force Base, Tennessee where he was engaged in the environmental testing of military and spacecraft propulsion systems.

Mr. Suggs was a Master Mason and a member of the Estill Springs Lodge. He was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of America. He had an avid interest in military history and was an active member of The Orders and Medals Society of America, The American Society of Military Insignia Collectors, Imperial German Collectors Society, Tennessee Military Collectors Association where he was a Life Member and Past President and was a Gold Badge member of the Ohio Valley Military Society.







Mrs. Winfrey Willis Widow of PhM1c John Willis Medal of Honor, Iwo Jima

Receives Medal of Honor Flag



A couple years ago the TMCA had run an article on Mrs. Winfrey Willis, the wife of PhM1c John Willis, of Columbia, TN, who was Killed in Action and was awarded the Medal of Honor on Iwo Jima in 1945. Mrs. Willis's original Medal of Honor was destroyed in a fire back in 1965 and was replaced shortly thereafter. When we looked at the medal to run the article, it was noted that on the back that it was engraved "Display", and not John Willis. Obviously it had come from a museum and was not an official Navy replacement medal. A request was then made for an official engraved replacement medal, and after a years worth of paper work and numerous calls, a replacement medal was finally awarded. The Navy had required proof a to the lose of the original, plus they required that the "Display" version be returned "first", before they issued out the new Medal of Honor. The control of the Medal of Honor is taken very seriously these days. Note; this medal came straight from the Washington awards branch and not from St Louis as most replacement medals do.

During this process, it was noted by Commander Redding, USN, that Mrs. Willis was also eligible for the newly enacted Medal of Honor Flag. This flag is an official Ceremonial Flag, unique to Medal of Honor recipients only.

Public Law 109-364, Section 555, titled "Authority for Presentation of **Medal** of **Honor Flag** to Living **Medal** of **Honor** Recipients and to Living Primary Next-of-Kin of Deceased **Medal** of **Honor** Recipients," dated October 17, 2006, established authority to award the **Medal** of **Honor Flag**, upon written request therefore, to the primary next of kin, as determined under regulations or procedures prescribed by the Secretary of Defense, of deceased **Medal** of **Honor** Recipients.

On Saturday, October 17, 2009, The Navy flew in from Washington, Rear Admiral M. H. Mittelman to present both the Flag and a replacement Medal of Honor. Members of the Navy's Hospital corps, former shipmates from the USS John Willis, Mayor Gentner and TMCA members were all present to assist in the ceremonies.

The event was held at and hosted by the American Legion Post 19, Columbia, TN.





Maj. Gen Earl Van Dorn

Ferguson Hall is one of the fine sights that may be seen while traveling down Hwy. 31 in Spring Hill. Building was completed in 1853 by owner Dr. John Haddox, one of the early physicians who practiced in this area for many years. He sold the property to Martin Cheairs about 1854. Ferguson Hall is most noted for an incident that transpired there in 1863 where Maj. Gen. Earl Van Dorn, Confederate cavalry commander was murdered by a jealous husband.
